City Announces Record Number Of Visitors to The Big Apple

Have you been picking up more fares from out of town? Here is why; Mayor Bloomberg announced that in 2005, a record 41 million out-of-towners flocked to the Big Apple — including 8.25 million in November and December.

"This is not just something that is restricted to Midtown Manhattan, it is a phenomenon that's taken place throughout all five boroughs, and that's important because in many ways tourism really is the backbone of our local economy," Bloomberg said.

With most of the 41 million visitors needing places to stay, hotel occupancy rates — and prices — have swelled to near-record levels.

More than 86 percent of the city's 70,000 rooms were full in December, even though the cost for a hotel room averaged \$233 a night.

Livery Cars Flag TLC's crackdown

The Taxi and Limousine Commission's crackdown on the licensing of livery-car services drew honks of complaints yesterday at a City Council hearing late in December.

Since January, the commission has been imposing stricter procedures and requirements for both new licenses and renewals of the existing licenses for the hundreds of on-call car services operating throughout the city.

The car services operate from base stations that generally consist of a dispatching facility and business office and, occasionally, a garage. The base stations are in effect the business entities that operate their respective car services

Each year, half of the 504 base stations licensed by the commission come up for renewal. They operate about 23,000 vehicles.

In the past, base-station renewals were approved on the staff level but, since January, renewals have required a review and approval of the TLC's ninemember board.

At a hearing of the Council's Transportation Committee, several Council members and representatives of the livery industry grumbled that the TLC has made the licensing process more cumbersome and costly.

The panel's chairman, Councilman John Liu (D-Queens), said that he and many other Council members have received calls about "the pressure" the TLC has been exerting on the livery industry.

But TLC Commissioner Matthew Daus testified that the procedures are aimed at ending noncompliance abuses that routinely allowed some noncomplying car services to continue to operate for a year or more with expired TLC licenses.

"There are several bases, many bases, throughout the city that have horrendous records of dispatching drivers without licenses, of dispatching drivers who have suspended licenses, vehicles that are not undergoing inspection and pose safety problems to the community," Daus said, in justifying the commission's crackdown.

Daus reported that 179 license renewals have been approved this year, out of 220 applications. Corrective actions are being sought from applicants who have yet to be relicensed.

Driver Busted in Cabby's Crash Death

The hit-and-run driver who caused a fiery crash that killed a hardworking taxi driver was arrested yesterday after witnesses identified him in a lineup, police

Freddy Romalchan, 27, of Brooklyn, was taken into custody at the 106th precinct station house at 3 p.m. and charged in the death of Gurbaj Singh.

Singh, 40, was driving a yellow cab when he was broadsided by a Chevy Astro minivan that witnesses say blew a red light at Rockaway Boulevard and 114th Street in Ozone Park at 1 a.m. Monday.

Romalchan, who was at the wheel of his stepfather's 2000 Astro, took off on foot with his passenger, authorities said.

Police said a second person is still being sought.

In addition to being hit with a murder rap, Romalchan was charged with criminally negligent homicide and criminal possession of a weapon, a .25-caliber pistol he allegedly left behind in the van, police sources said.

Romalchan had been eyed as a suspect since shortly after the crash.

At the station house, police sources said, he had injuries consistent with a car accident — including a bruise across the chest where a seat belt would have left an impression.

Romalchan told investigators he was about to report the van stolen when police hauled him in for questioning. But witnesses identified him as one of two men abandoning the van and fleeing.

NYC's Chinatown, Little Italy designated taxfree business zones

Chinatown and parts of Little Italy in Lower Manhattan were designated Empire Zones, providing businesses that locate or expand there with tax breaks.

The Legislature and Pataki have used the zones for economically hard-hit areas. The state compensates local schools and governments for the lost taxes.

"No community in New York state is more deserving of Empire Zone benefits than Chinatown and Lower Manhattan," said Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, who represents the area. "The economic hardships experienced by business in lower Manhattan since Sept. 11 have been significant. This announcement is a tremendous step forward in rebuilding our downtown community."

Mayor Michael Bloomberg applauded the designation for the two Lower Manhattan districts.

"Over the past four years, the more than 1,200 businesses in the city's Empire Zones have created over 23,000 jobs, and in no place will the benefits of a new Empire Zone have a more far-reaching impact than in Chinatown and the Lower East Side, whose businesses have suffered more than their fair share of hardship in recent years," Bloomberg said.

EPA Fuel Economy Ratings Have Shortfalls Of Up To 50 Percent

Window Stickers Vastly Overstate MPG. Consumer Reports Study Finds

Fuel economy tests conducted by Consumer Reports show that government figures posted on new-car window stickers can have shortfalls of up to 50 percent, according to an investigation published in Consumer Reports magazine.

Findings

Brakes That Pay Attention When The Driver Doesn't

AFTER years of concentrating their efforts on reducing injuries caused by collisions, auto engineers are increasingly turning their attention to what happens in the moments before an impact.

Stability control systems have become ever more capable of catching spins before they end in a crash: brakes can now be programmed to recognize panic stops and apply maximum force for hesitant drivers. BMW's "active steering" will counter a driver's overly aggressive moves at the steering wheel in an emergency maneuver, and Infiniti offers a system that warns when the car is drifting toward an adjacent lane and a possible fender-bender.

Some luxury cars already have systems that put the car into protective mode when sensors indicate a collision is imminent cinching down seat belts, closing the sunroof and windows. Automakers are proposing computers that decide how aggressively to act based on how closely the driver is paying attention

In a demonstration drive held on

technologies: brakes that apply on their own when a crash seems likely.

As I accelerated the 2006 Acura RL toward a target - a foam rear bumper attached by a long bracket to the side of a moving car - my senses told me I was closing in too quickly. A series of warnings - part of what Acura calls a collision mitigation braking system activated, first alerting me to the danger with a warning tone and a flashing light on the dashboard, then gently tugging the driver's seat belt. Finally, the system applied the brakes forcefully to slow the car. It all happened with no action required by me to prevent a (simulated) rear collision.

Rear-end collisions are a logical starting point for any effort at reducing accidents: of the 6.2 million crashes reported in the United States during 2004, more than 20 percent were rear impacts, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Acura's system, like others that act pre-emptively, takes advantage of onboard computers already in the car to control features like antilock brakes and pretensioners that pull seat belts taut in a collision.

The common denominator of all the pre-emptive systems is an a parking-lot test course here, I tried advanced feature called adaptive one of the newest safety cruise control. Unlike conventional

speed controls, which are designed simply to hold a steady speed, adaptive controls can also maintain a set distance to cars ahead. The car speeds up or slows down in response to measurements from a laser or radar unit.

Taking advantage of the adaptive cruise control technology and hardware, the pre-emptive safety systems use existing sensors to monitor cars or even stationary objects in the vehicle's path, continuously evaluating the possibility of a collision.

Mercedes-Benz was the first automaker to feature a pre-emptive safety system in the United States. Its S-Class luxury sedans were equipped for 2003 with a system it called Pre-Safe, which took action milliseconds before a crash to reel in any slack in the seat belts, close the sunroof and adjust the seat to place the occupant in the safest position.

The next generation of the Mercedes system adds functions: it closes the side windows and gives the driver full braking power the moment the brakes are applied, increasing the pressure if they are not applied with enough force to prevent a collision. It will be standard equipment in the 2007 S-Class, which goes on sale next

The Lexus Pre-Collision System

operates much the same way. When it senses an imminent collision, it retracts the seat belts and primes the brake system so that full braking power will be available immediately. The system is an option on the Lexus LS and GS models.

Infiniti also offers two preemptive safety features on some of its vehicles. Pre-Crash seat belts, which retract prior to a collision, are standard on M and Qseries sedans. Preview Braking, which uses cruise control sensors to identify potential crash situations, primes the brakes to assure that maximum stopping power is immediately available. It is optional on the M, Q and FX models.

Acura's system is the only one that will automatically apply the brakes without driver intervention. An option on the 2006 RL, the system uses a radar unit in the grille to continuously monitor the rate at which the car is closing in on a vehicle ahead, up to 300 feet away. When sensors determine that a collision is likely, the electronics begin a three-stage procedure.

First, a warning lamp that says "brake" flashes on the dashboard, directly below the speedometer,

TLC Commissioner's Corner

December 2005 was quite a month, indeed. We made it through a three day transit strike the first in 25 years, and hopefully the last we will ever see!

During my almost 10 years of having worked at the TLC, I have participated in planning for several citywide transit strikes that had thankfully never happened. My staff and I had also successfully implemented private bus strike contingency plans that provided us with the critical experience that was put to good use. After all those years of planning, I must say that I was very impressed with the plan that was developed, and even more so by the professionalism, dignity and skill with which it was implemented by our TLC team and our regulated industries.

As Mayor Bloomberg said, while all of us hoped for the best, we also needed to prepare for the worst, which is exactly what the City's Contingency Plan did. The TLC's portion of the plan was designed to "supplement not replace" bus and subway service for displaced commuters by providing one of several alternate service options. The two primary goals of this plan were its "simplicity" and "efficiency." The plan permitted "group riding" and provided additional economic incentives for drivers who picked-up

additional passengers, promoting the most efficient use of for-hire ground transportation services. The plan also included a simple "zone fare" system that was the same for for-hire vehicles and taxicabs.

By and large, the system worked well, with drivers working hard to match their capacity with riders in need. The TLC's regulated industries moved more passengers in three days than they have probably ever moved during any comparable period in New York City history. Despite media reports which highlighted the few glitches and problems that occurred, the number of complaints against drivers was less than expected given the new system and the increased number of passengers transported. The TLC received a record number of hits on its website, totaling approximately 1.3 Million for the week; and there were fewer questions than expected about how the plan worked, which was a testament to its simplicity.

There was a significant amount of media attention that was focused on alleged "price gouging" during the strike. I know that the overwhelming majority of business owners and drivers did the right thing by carrying out the plan legally and with a desire to help their fellow New Yorkers. However, there were



unfortunately a handful of individuals who overcharged customers by not implementing the system correctly, or who were just downright greedy. Some passenger calls alleging price gouging actually turned out to be either venting about the increased fares under the plan or just simple misunderstandings about what they could be charged. However, you can rest assured that all complaints are under active investigation, and the few individuals who violated the law will be prosecuted to its full extent.

Over the next weeks and months, the TLC will be reviewing every aspect of the implementation of the Contingency Plan in conjunction with its government partners, including the Mayor's Office of Emergency Management and the New York City Department

of Transportation. As a part of that review, the TLC will be looking for and hopefully collecting the stories that make up the most human side of why this plan worked so well, and the ways in which it could have worked even better. I hope your story will be among them.

I would like to again offer my most heartfelt thanks to the tens of thousands of men and women who make up New York City's taxicab and for-hire vehicle industries. You helped New York City to shine, and although you could not truly replace the missing mass transit service, it never for a moment stopped you from trying.

Once again, thank you so much - and Happy New Year!

Telling It Like It Is

I salute every New York City Cab Driver for your help in keeping our City moving during the Transit Strike. Between street closures, insane traffic and needing at least three passengers to get into Manhattan



south of 96th Street you all did an incredible job. Dedicated taxi lanes on the avenues and allowing taxis to make turns where regular traffic can't, would have made it a little easier. I know of some drivers that made less money than usual because of the strike. Even though the City set up fare zones, a lot of you gave your passengers a break because you just couldn't charge as much as you were allowed to (an example is the cab driver that picked up a family of four at LaGuardia Airport and charged them less than the approved \$20.00 per person). You all stuck with it and did what you could to help people get to where they needed to go. Once again, New York City Taxis bailed the City out. You all deserve a great big THANK YOU from our City....and then some.

Your latest reward for being the best Taxi Industry in the world is rising gas prices. In

just the past month the cost of regular gas has increased by between 15% and 20%. LOMTO submitted a petition to the TLC for a gas surcharge back in September 2005. The TLC's response to a very reasonable request (that most other major U.S. cities gave to their cab drivers): NO! The rule makers of our City need to realize the cost of everything is going up. Since 1996 the cost of living has increased by over 24%. How are we supposed to survive?

Speaking of rules, the annual drug test rules where changed on November 17, 2005. By now you should all know that the TLC stopped sending reminder cards for drug testing to licensed taxi driver's. You're supposed to know when you need to be tested. OK, here's the short version:

- 1. You need to take a drug test every
- 2. You need to take this test no more than 30 days before the month and day of your license expiration date. (Failure to do so results in license suspension).
- 3. If you are not tested until 30 days after the month and day of your license expiration date you will be fined \$200.00.

REMEMBER; GET YOUR DRUG TEST **EVERYYEAR!**

And speaking of reminder cards, the TLC stopped sending reminder cards for vehicle inspection. After you are inspected, keep your vehicle inspection report (VIR). The next date and time for inspection is on that report. If you miss an inspection your medallion goes on suspension and you will pay a fine.

I think it's time for the City to start trying to make life easier for cab drivers and pay more attention to our problems. Taxis are an important part of keeping this city moving. We serve almost a million people a day and that's a lot of people. Sometimes I think we are our own worst enemy. A lot of you sit back and complain about how tough it is being a cab driver. 

Watch Those Pink Tickets; Complaints About Other Drivers

Hello everybody and Happy New Year! I hope you are all working hard and making good money.

First, I am noticing that police are writing a lot of pink/criminal summonses at this time. If you get a pink summons, please be careful it is for criminal court and is much more serious then a regular yellow summons. If you fail to appear on a pink summons return date, a warrant will likely issue for your arrest and you could wind up with a criminal record. Please contact a lawyer to see if you need ***** representation for such a ticket.

Second, the police are writing a lot of bus lane tickets along with improper turn tickets. Please be careful on Madison Avenue as the police seem to writing many tickets at this location.

Third, please be extra careful near Penn Station as police are writing a ton of tickets at this location. If you are at Penn Station, don't do anything improper or you will get multiple summonses.

Fourth, remember to call me at 866-LAW-MIKE if you have any problems like customer complaints or DMV or pink tickets or if you have a question you want me to answer in the column.

Fifth, please be careful to avoid domestic disputes. If you hit your wife or girlfriend (or if you woman drivers hit your husband or boyfriend), you can get arrested, If you get arrested, more then likely, TLC will suspend your hack license while a criminal case pends against you. This could result in your being out of work for many months. TLC sometimes won't reinstate your license even if the complainant (wife, etc) withdraws her complaint. TLC will only return your hack license if the case is finished and charges are dismissed or adjourned in contemplation of dismissal or other similar result. Please don't get into any fights!!

Sixth, if you are a driver, I would urge you NOT to go to TLC with a complaint against another driver, even if you see misconduct on the road by another driver. TLC is not a good place to "get even" or to "settle a score." TLC could wind up getting the complaining driver in trouble. Now I am not saying if

another driver punches you that you should settle it outside the TLC. In such a case, I would rather see TLC handle it then for it to wind up in the hands of the police. But, in general, I would urge drivers to refuse to complain to TLC about conduct of other taxi drivers.

wanted all employees to pay 6% towards pensions, a demand they later backed down from. Some current employees wanted only new employees to pay the threatened 6% of their total income (including overtime) into the pension fund. (Easy to say screw the new guy) Instead, every current Transit Union worker will be paying 1 1/2% of their salaries into the health insurance fund. This seems to be the beginning of the end of the pension and benefit system in America as we know it. How long will benefits be a benefit?

Yet, if I had any type of retirement plan, it would probably supply a certain comfort level regarding my future and my family's future. No one can live solely on social security. Fairly speaking, no one can live with the fear that twenty years of contributed money will evaporate into a pension plan containing only zeros either.

The present federal administration gives the biggest tax breaks to the biggest savers, the top 1% of the wealthiest Americans. Meanwhile, a portion of the middle class suffers with declining pension coverage, employers that are cutting back on their contributions to 401k's and high risk exposure on existing 401k's. This places the highest level of financial uncertainty ever on the future of formerly secure Americans. The system is breaking down. Are we all better off totally without pensions? Corporate America believes we are.

Recently I attended a meeting with the management team of one of the largest American car manufacturers. They bluntly stated that \$1,500 of each car produced goes to pay for a certain employee benefit while only \$1,200 of each vehicle made, goes for steel. I cannot stop thinking about that statement. It put things in order in my mind about outsourcing. Why do you think every company that can is now outsourcing?

Speaking of outsourcing; Recently, I needed to speak with a teller at the bank across the street. I called information, dialed the number and got a person with an accent. I happened to ask where my call was connected to. The answer was India. Amazing isn't it. To call across the street and having the call connected to New Delhi, India. The worst part about my call is that New Delhi could not help me with my problem nor would they give me the local branch's phone number. In my case, customer service simply did not work with fiscal outsourcing of jobs!


My point is simple. With no pensions provided for workers in New Delhi or Thailand or Mexico (and the list goes on), any corporation simply


becomes more profitable. It is more cost effective for any corporation to have employees with NO benefits. If every American car cost \$1,500 less to build, foreign vehicles would not have the unfair financial advantage as they do now.

Thirty years ago bumper stickers advertised the words BUY AMERICAN. It may be too late to buy American today because American companies are located in other countries in order to reduce expenses.

While world trade may ultimately end up providing the world's population with a higher standard of life, be thankful for any benefits you have. Be thankful you have a job. Your job may end up being transferred to China next year.

About the only good thing to come from this worldly financial scenario is that we do not have to worry about pensions or our jobs. Driving a New York City taxi can only be done in one place, New York City.

Combined and Renewal Discounts

A big source of savings is to insure your cars with the same company that insures your house. Make sure you ask if combined coverage is available. This will lower your payments on your car insurance and make your homeowner's policy cheaper too.

It's also important to make sure you are getting a "renewal" discount that many car insurance companies offer. This is a discount given to people who have been with the same insurance company for an extended period of time. If you have carried insurance with a company for several years, and not had an accident, your insurance company likes you. Think about it. You paid them a lot of money and they didn't have to do anything except send you bills and cash your checks. True, they were ready to do something if you got in an accident. But you didn't get into an accident so they're happy and want to continue their relationship with you. A renewal discount is a good incentive to urge you to return. And it's a good reason for you to stay with them.

Discounts for Auto Safety Features

Auto safety features will also lower your payments. Heading the list of money saving safety features is antilock brakes. Certain states — such as Florida, New Jersey and New York — encourage drivers to buy cars with antilock brakes by requiring insurers to give discounts. Check to see if you live in such a state, or if the insurance company you are considering gives a discount for this feature. Automatic seatbelts and airbags are also frequently rewarded with insurance discounts.

Assume More Risk

Two powerful ways to bring your coverage down is to assume a higher risk. This is done in two ways. The most dramatic reduction can be realized by dropping your collision insurance on an older car. If the car is worth less than \$2,000, you'll probably spend more insuring it than it is worth. The whole idea of driving an older car is to save money, so why not get what is coming to you?

Another way to redesign your policy — and save money in the process — is to ask for a higher deductible. The deductible is the amount of money

you have to pay before your insurance company begins paying the rest. In other words, you pay for the little dings and bumps and let your insurance company pay for the heavy hits.

For example, a common deductible amount is \$500. This means if an accident you're in causes \$1,500 worth of damage, you pay \$500 and the insurance company pays \$1,000. You could, however, set your deductible to \$1,000. This still covers you against heavy losses, but it may decrease your monthly premium by as much as 30 percent.

As a final note, if you are being strangled by high insurance costs, keep this in mind when you go car shopping next time. The more expensive and higher-performance the car is, the higher the premium will be. This is particularly true of cars that are frequently stolen, or are expensive to repair. The insurance company keeps this in mind when setting its insurance rates for this vehicle. Shop for a low-profile car and get your kicks in other ways. You'll love the savings you'll see on your auto insurance.

and a warning tone rings through the audio system. If the distance between the two vehicles does not increase, the system begins a second stage of actions, applying the brakes lightly while an electric pretensioner takes the slack out of the driver's seat belt with a gentle warning tug. If this is still not enough to prevent the crash, the system's third stage will forcefully retract both front seat belts and apply stronger braking to reduce the car's speed.

While it will not bring the vehicle to a complete stop on its own, the system will apply about 75 percent of the car's braking capacity. Acura has asked insurance companies to consider offering discounts to owners of RL's with the system, said William Walton, a product planner at Acura.

While pre-emptive safety systems are now offered on only a few vehicles, they are expected to become more available. Mike Thoeny, an engineer at Delphi, the automotive supplier, said the company was working with several automakers to develop new applications, including systems that use a camera to differentiate moving objects from stationary ones.

By the end of the decade, Mr. Thoeny said, pre-emptive safety systems will also monitor the driver and tailor responses based on alertness, issuing a warning sooner if the driver's eyes are not on the road. Lexus showed just such a concept at the Tokyo auto show in October.

"We have this technologically ready today," Mr. Thoeny said. "It's simply a matter of integrating it into the vehicle."

whipped around the track in a Chevrolet Suburban and a pair of Cadillac CTS sedans, seemingly intent on causing a collision.
